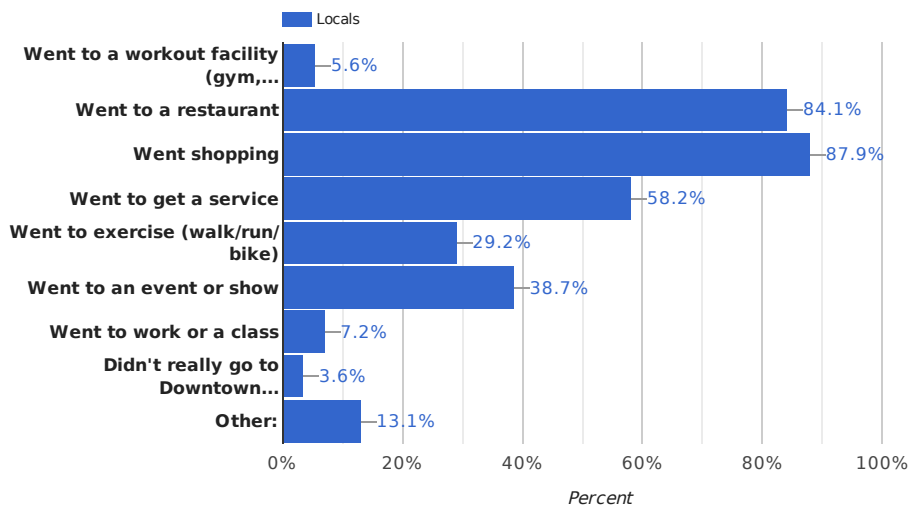

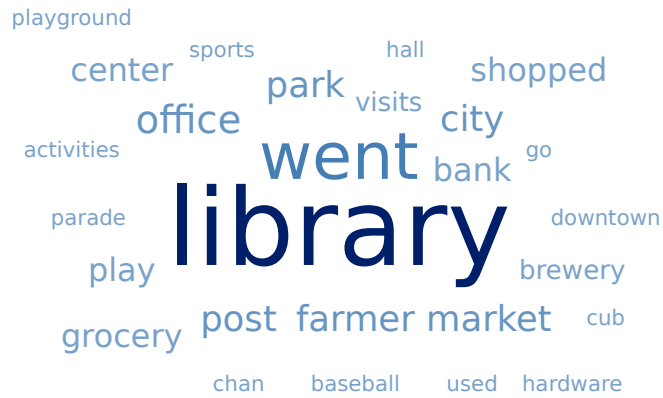

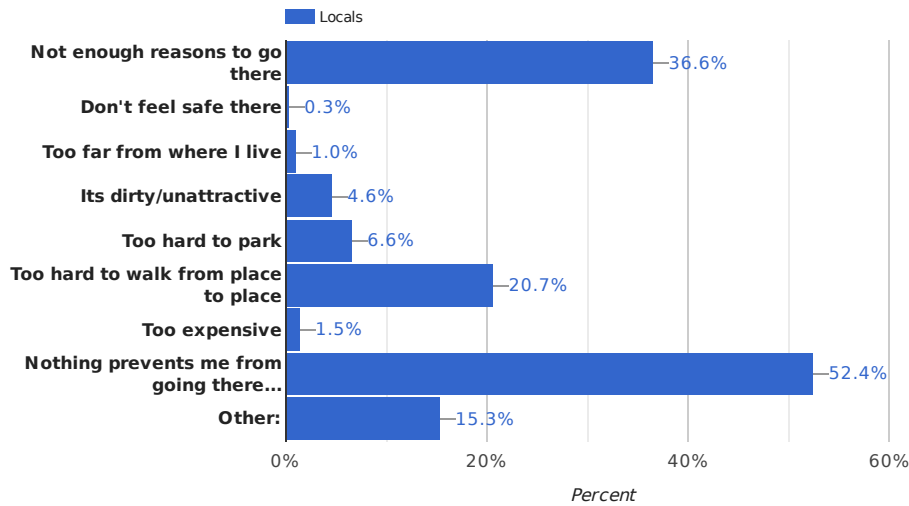

Crossing 5 is sometimes a challenge

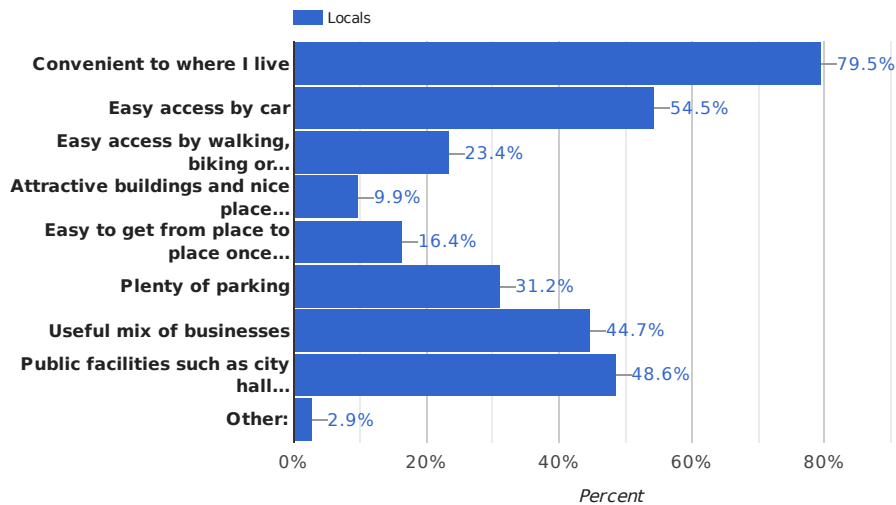

I try to avoid the so-called "downtown."

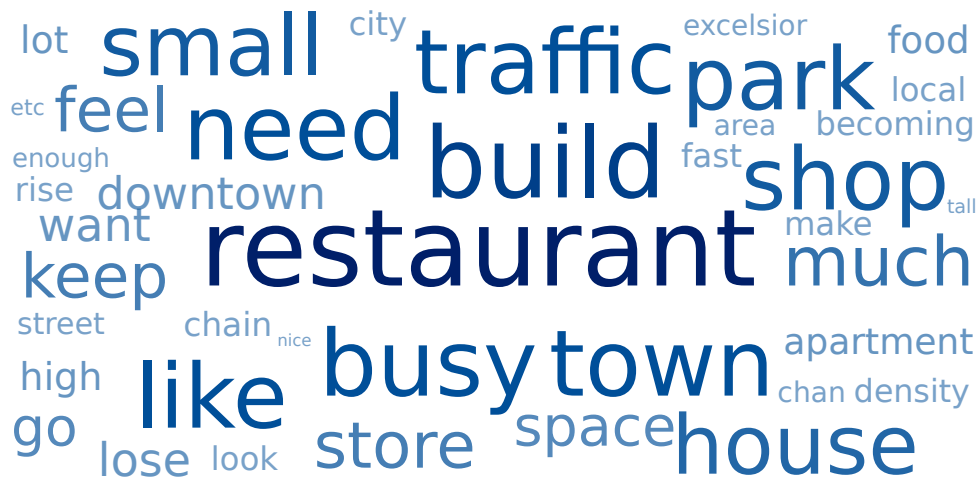
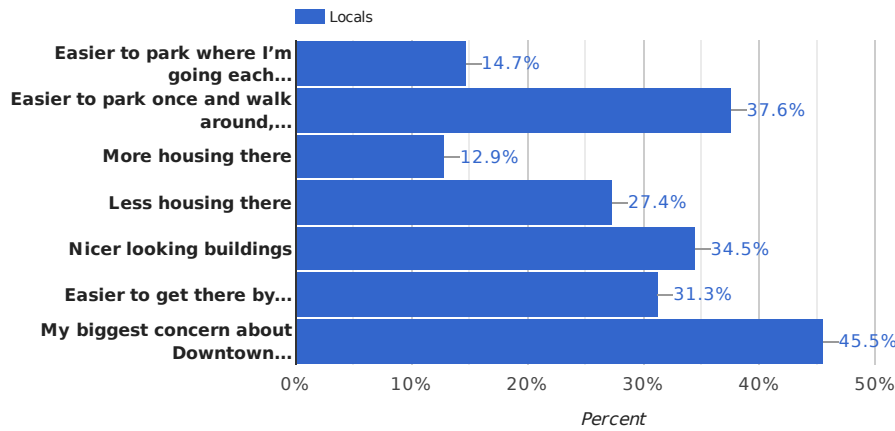

Honestly just get an intern to do a competitive analysis of what other cities are doing well and where Chanhassen is missing the mark. (restaurants per capita, boutiques per capita, etc). Also Chanhassen really needs to make the city more family friendly. easy parking, easy walking, parks, splash pads, pools, indoor children's play spaces, etc.

We need more retail and restaurants in Downtown Chanhassen. I'm interested in what Avienda will bring to Chanhassen.

Don't feel there is consensus on a master plan. Been going on for too long. City planner and council has not done a good job.

Not looking forward to traffic disruptions and limited access to buildings with possible construction

The nicest thing I like about Chanhassen is the Library, Summer Concerts in the Park, I don't like how hard it is to drive some of the streets and make turns into businesses (scary). Poor planning on streets i.e. Chick-fil-Lay, Holiday gas station, trying to turn into Cub Foods or exit Cub Foods, the motorized skateboards that don't stop at lights or crossings, the bikers who choose not to follow driving laws with stopping at red lights. Before new things in Chanhassen I would suggest taking care of some of the current difficulties with getting around on some of the streets.

I would love there to be less development (like housing), and more resources used for creating green spaces, unique restaurants (ice cream!), investing in environmentally friendly practices (like planting native, pollinator friendly plants and managing invasive species such as buckthorn/garlic mustard), public gardens, etc. The current feel of Downtown Chanhassen is so commercial - commercial businesses, chain restaurants, etc. I would love for it to feel more quaint and more of a destination that I would be happy to spend the day exploring with friends and family - like Excelsior or Stillwater.

No more high density housing in DT Chanhassen. No more tall buildings in DT Chanhassen! This is not a mini Minneapolis and that is why I love Chanhassen.

I agree it needs to change. I hope Chanhassen still keeps its small town feel though. It should not be too modern. It should not look like EP.

We need more unique restaurants and stores, rather than just chains.

Along with the grocery stores, banks and local services - Make it a destination with interesting architecture, green space and unique retail and restaurants that are not big box or chain

It's hard to balance the needs and wants of thousands of people but keep the goal of a smaller town, nice place to love, friendly atmosphere in mind. Just because you can, doesn't mean you should.

How do we attract better restaurants? We literally never as a family go to downtown chanhassen to eat. I would argue downtown Victoria has better options!

Fix the roads!

Bringing back an Applebees or similar restaurant would help. Also having a breakfast restaurant option besides the legion would help.

Simple, fix the timing on the left turn light when going east on W 78th ST to east on W 78th St. The left hand turn signal often only allows 3-4 cars through at a time. If there is 4 or more cars, one might have to sit through another cycle of lights even though there are no other cars. It's a waste of time & energy (i.e., gas or electricity)

Please see that it includes lots of trees, grass, flowers, nature.

Tou need to push out more information. I've been out of town ever meeting or I'd go!

Not having multiples of the same businesses. More small business.

more variety of shopping (stores offering a greater variety of goods & services)

Please do not yield to those who want to forbid change and prohibit free-market businesses from opening. It is fine if they want to withhold any tax breaks the city might be asked to provide, but otherwise don't be an obstacle to development.

Please do NOT ban new drive up businesses (like Minneapolis wanted to do or actually did). I like living in Chanhassen.

I really dont think we want to add fast food chains etc. It would be much better to keep small businesses and good parking for the residents. Aldi is somewhat of an eyesore and the parking is not great. Looks a bit trashy compared to the rest of downtown. I think focusing on Green space and places people can gather would be the best option (coffee houses, specialty restaurant with attractive outdoor spaces)

Sidewalks on both sides of the street, and safer walking/biking corridors to get there from south of Hwy 5

Mor AFFORDABLE housing in the form of apartments and/or condominiums

downtown Chanhassen is not appealing. There isn't any charm and nothing giving me a real reason to want to go. Would rather go in to EP or Excelsior.

Take a lesson from Excelsior(minus their parking)... variety of retail and restaurants; architecturally attractive. We are fortunate to already have a parking ramp! No more groceries, banks, liquor stores, gas stations, fast food. Food truck "court" would be fun.

Chan is great the way it is, however I wish there was a directory of all the businesses in Downtown...like published in the paper. That would re-acclimate residents (including myself who is new/3 years living here) to all the choices and options.

I'd like to see Chanhassen resist the efforts afoot to develop like the rest of the metro suburbs. Maybe make Chanhassen more like what was done in Victoria. Nice restaurants (not all fast food), nice bookstore, coffee shops (not Starbucks/Caribou). Something more quaint to make is a pleasant place to visit and walk around in.

Take a look at Hopkins

Don't try to be a city you're not. Don't try to emulate other cities that aren't worth emulating. Think about how to keep Chan true to its identity, while pursuing a development path that is uniquely suited to us.

We need some brunch options

More bike racks so parking for various locations and businesses is easier / more convenient.

A Mainstreet with restaurants and shops would be ideal.

Please plan for more bicyclists in the future, especially with the popularity of ebikes. This includes trails and bike racks. How about locations for shared electric bikes?

Increase the library parking. Too often it is filled up with county vehicles, farmer's market and other special event parking. Improve the senior center so that it can offer more things.

It appears the town was designed for the benefit of retailers/retail developers in the days when people commuted to work, not as a place for people to live, recreate and work. There doesn't appear to be a master plan, just chunks of different strip malls, large retail establishments with too much real estate dedicated to parking thrown together to optimize car traffic flow without concern for the overall aesthetic or fostering a sense of community. The area around the library is nice. I'd like to see more of that. Concentrate parking, encourage foot traffic, provide places for people to eat, recreate, relax and congregate. With 3 giant parking lots (Cub, Target, and Byerly's, it is not very attractive or pedestrian friendly. It has too much of a strip mall look, which is nothing special in my mind.

Allow for green spaces along the curbs and have some trees and plantings not just all concrete and asphalt.

Downtown is the way it should be. Comfortably populated and used. We really don't need to become Excelsior where no one but outsiders want to go there because it is too crowded. If we start putting more condos and apartments there it will become too crowded with people and make it impossible to navigate in a vehicle.

The really tall apartment/retail is an eyesore. Just doesn't fit the aesthetics of downtown Chan that I'd like to see

Let's get more strips of beautiful nature/greens in between the asphalt/concrete to line the streets and sidewalks.

I'm not really sure how much can be changed in downtown Chanhassen. The infrastructure seems pretty locked down. I like that Chanhassen has a lot of parks, but other than Target and a few restaurants, Chanhassen does not really have a traditional main street vibe as things seem spread out in a series of strip malls. I love Chanhassen, and these aren't really problems per say, it's just the nature of our city.

Please keep renewable energy in mind, solar panels would be a great addition to our city facilities.

Keep Main Street with less dense, high rise buildings. Build those high rises by 212 or down by MN River.

Would like some quality restaurants and retail. Mostly all chain now that doesn't appeal to me

No more high rise buildings, we should strive to maintain the small town feel and historic locations. Don't feel that we need anymore fast food or apartment buildings.

The City should reach out in both a formal and an informal way to the existing businesses for their ideas as to how changes might affect their continued success.

Stop allowing so many chain businesses in

We would love a better mix of restaurants, retail (smaller shops) and other places to go. There are too many smaller offices on the main levels of buildings so near the dinner theater, for instance, there are not other entertainment Or nicer eating places to go or very few.

A town square Parking located behind --not in front of-- buildings. Buildings should be located close to sidewalks/streets. Include several EV charging stations.

Balance development while retaining small local businesses, minimizing negative impact to parks/schools, and encouraging sustainable development.

Several parking areas seem to be under-utilized, like the proposed Café Zuppa site. If done correctly, I'd rather see in-fill businesses than developing more raw land. But, serious traffic studies need to be a big part of any of these proposals.

I would make 79th one way west to East. I'd make Great Plains one way northbound from 79th to the dinner theater. That would push the traffic leaving 79th to Great Plains to get on 5, and 78th to Market Street. 79th being so close to 5 is a problem and it seems like this could help and makes walking along Market safer. It's a terrible area for pedestrians. If we add two more apartments, traffic will get worse so changes will be needed.
